

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SAHNAS BROTHERS

Having Fun By Peter Spitzer

If you look up videos or go to the shows of Thano and Demetri Sahnas playing together, you might notice one specific but subtle aspect. They never stop smiling.

Throughout their performance you'll see them interacting with, and bringing out the joy in, their crowd, their music, and themselves. This boils down to one of their core values. As Thano put it, "Thirty years ago, before we really had our own thing going, we had built a very small recoding studio in a casita behind our parent's house. We got to work with a lot of musicians. We saw how they interacted with each other and what makes bands break up. We saw how people's agendas got in the way and made the music not fun for everyone. We learned to love music for the fun of it and to not take it too seriously."

Mischief-Makers to Musicians

So, how did this fun-loving brother duo get started? "Well, we grew up as two boys thirteen months apart. The Sahnas Brothers probably got started when we were just getting into trouble together; playing with firecrackers and trying to jump garbage cans with our BMX bikes. That's when our team... our teamwork really began as eight, nine, ten-year-old's."

The roots for their musical talent came early, as there was always music in the home. "Music was a big part of the family, so my Mom of course took us to piano lessons. Demetri and I did not

like those piano lessons. As a kid I didn't want to learn how to read music. So I would sing these songs we were learning in my head on the way home from the lesson, sit on the piano and work it out from memory until I could play it really good. So, for two years I faked it and didn't read the music. but ended up teaching myself how to play by ear. One dav mv Mom was playing a song on the Spanish guitar and I bet her \$5

that she could show me those four chords she was playing and I could come back in thirty minutes and play that song for her. I did."

A Unique Career

Before they knew it, the Sahnas Brothers were done taking

I did." piano lessons and moved on to guitar lessons. This new teacher happened to be in a "cool" band with a "very cool" bass player.

Demetri took a bass lesson one day which sent him down his own path of expertise while Thano kept on with guitar. By the time they were teenagers they had started a band. "We actually

started doing traditional Greek folk music even though our



guitar lessons were all based on the prolific work of Led Zeppelin, Van Halen, and Ozzy Osbourne", Thano added with a laugh.

Not enjoying that type of music, their Dad stumbled upon a Greek bouzouki (a kind of large mandolin) in a pawn shop and placed it in the corner of the house. The brothers naturally picked it up, started messing around with it, and eventually learned a few traditional Greek songs on it.

This continued with them playing at the local Greek Orthodox Church. Soon their young career launched into

selling homemade cassettes, playing at school events, starting a rock band, and making a name for themselves before many musicians even get started.

Thano's advice for aspiring artists is consistent with his life lessons. "Just do it because you love it. If you enjoy it yourself, people will be attracted to it like a

magnet. Because it's genuine. Count the dollars later because nobody makes enough monev in music to consider it a secure job. One day you'll be on top of the world and able to pay your bills and the next day vou'll be stranded. I've had it happen several times, but I just go back at it because I love it and the waves seem to clear."

Staying Accessible

From these varied experiences the Sahnas Brothers have discovered their spirit, and what has carried

their career. "We used to do the arts and crafts festival circuit. We would have these three-day events multiple times a year where we

> would perform on the street every twenty minutes. We would talk with and meet the most fun and interesting people. That carries to today where in between sets at performances we like to go out and talk to the crowd and thank them for coming. It's more fun for us and

it helps the experience feel more complete. We truly believe it's a blessing that someone would come home from work, put on a clean shirt, and bring a date to see us. That's a real honor that someone would be that excited to come hear our music. We respect that and it keeps us humble."

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DID YOU KNOW?

How to Make a Gift Bag out of wrapping Paper By Joshua Allred

Spread holiday cheer with this unique and personalized way to wrap Christmas gifts!





For this project you will need at least wrapping paper, scissors, and tape. If you would like to embellish your gift bag in any way you may choose to incorporate ribbon, twine, bows, or other such decorations.



4. Fold up the bottom of your bag. Fold the left and right sides of the bag in to create a diamond shape. Finally, fold in the top and bottom of the diamond shape to meet in the middle and tape the seam. These folds create the bottom of your bag.

3. Fold the left and right sides of your wrapping paper in until they meet in the middle. Apply tape up and down the entirety of the seam.



5. Open up your bag and insert your selected gift. Fold the top of your bag over and seal it with tape. Embellish the top with decorations of your choice. We used a hole punch to make a space to tie a bow from simple twine.

2. Once you have a gift selected, measure out and cut a piece of wrapping paper large enough to comfortably encircle your item. Lay the wrapping paper down flat with the patternless side facing up.

Art is neither easily defined nor contained by media, method, or motive, but seems to have one transcendent prerequisite. Art makes us feel. 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

Sitting at number • four is A Nightmare Before Christmas (1993). This film follows Jack Skellington,



Halloweentown's beloved pumpkin king. Jack starts to become bored of the same routine of frightening people in the "real world" when he accidentally stumbles on Christmastown and falls in love with the bright colors and warm spirits.

He plots to kidnap Santa Claus and take over his roll of Christmastown, but soon discovers that even the best laid plans can go awry. "I love the story and music. Overall, it's a fantasy type movie and combines

several different holidays into one. The overall theme is family, friends, and that everything can turn out right in the end. Even if things go wrong." **5.** Holiday In Handcuffs (2007) starring Melissa Joan Hart and Mario Lopez, is number five. 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
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
