### HEATHER MASSIE

Astronaut to Actor By Josh Allred

Hedy Lamarr was, throughout her life, a stunningly beautiful actor and unsung inventor. Known today as 'the most beautiful woman in the world' and 'the mother of Wi-Fi' her life left a lasting mark on both science and cinema.

'HEDY! The Life & Inventions of Hedy Lamarr' uses the accomplished and impactful life of Hedy Lamarr to inspire and encourage according to the writer and performer of the play, Heather Massie. "My mission is to inspire audiences to make the world a better place. Especially to encourage young women in science and technology."

### **Kindred Spirits**

Some of us can't remember the desired career of our eight year old selves, much less say that we pursued them. Heather Massie can claim both. "From the time I was eight years old I wanted to be an astronaut; or an inventor, or to work with animals. I really focused on math & science and started university in astrophysics with the goal of becoming an astronaut."

Heather studied at the University of Virginia and later at The Virginia Tech School of the Arts

learning about Theatre Arts. At this time in her life, Heather feels a connection with the subject of her play. "Hedy and I are kindred spirits in that she was a performer who loved science."

#### **Full Circle**

Heather offers a couple reasons for her transition between astronaut and actor. The first being a simple lack of interest. "I

felt like I wasn't enjoying the work in school as much as I needed to have a chance doing what I wanted to do, which was to be an astronaut.

Second were circumstances beyond her control that

prompted a pause in her aspirations. "I had mono one year and I got behind, and that was when I was first diagnosed with clinical depression. I knew I needed to take some time off."

During this time Heather was able to further investigate an interest that she was never able to fully embrace due to a hectic schedule. She began taking theater classes

out of personal interest. When she went back to formal education she went for Theatre Arts, graduating Summa Cum Laude.

After compiling an extensive acting

resume she determined to go solo to realize some of the goals

she had collected during her career. "I thought that I would eventually land in some project that would involve science and that never happened. I

always wanted an international tour. That didn't happen. So, in order to create something that I could take anywhere in the world, I decided I wanted to feature a woman in science as a solo play."

Now she finds work in a variety of venues, performing effectively in locations as small as an Irish pub and as big as a 2,000 seat theater, with interest from audiences in both science and art. "I really did put science in a box and put it away. Now I've found a way to take that out and honor all the parts of me."

### **Slaying the Dragon**

Many grapple with depression to some degree or another, be it a permanent affliction, or a

temporary episode. Heather's thoughtful advice echoes the actions she took to rediscover a love for life, and a purpose in her work. "I guess the advice that I could impart is to do something that you love to do, and that is close to your

heart, and to your love for life. That is what gets me through the hard bits. Even when it's a battle with myself.

Heather's own struggle led to the forced pause in her life that directed her to acting, but it is still a battle. "I do struggle. I have to slay the dragon everyday, but a lot of times I win."

# DID YOU KNOW?

### **HEDY LAMARR**


Hedy Lamarr, known as both 'the most beautiful woman in the world' and 'the mother of Wi-Fi', was both actor and inventor during her impactful and acomplished life.




Hedy Lamarr's natural beauty lent itself to her interest in acting and a career in film began when she was discovered by director Max Reinhardt at age 16. Her first role was for the small 1930 German film, *Money on the Street*. After playing additional small roles she eventually gained recognition internationally for her part in the controversial film, *Ecstasy* in 1933.



Originally named Hedwig Eva Kiesler, Lamarr was born in Vienna, Austria on November 9th, 1914. As a child she was exposed to the arts by her mother, a concert pianist, in the form of formal piano and ballet lessons. Her inventive side was fostered by her father, a bank director and curious man himself, who would take her on long walks where they discussed the inner workings of various machines.






possessive Austrian munitions dealer, Fritz Mandl who restrained her from further performances. In 1937 she fled to London and soon after went to Hollywood following an introduction to Louis B. Mayer, of MGM Studios where she secured work.

Her acting career was temporarily halted after her marriage to the


It was in Hollywood that she changed her name to Hedy Lamarr. Her American film debut was as Gaby in the 1938 romantic drama, *Algiers*. During her time in film she was known for her many roles as a mysterious and exotic seductress. Her most recognized role was as Delilah in the 1949 epic drama, Samson and Delilah, which won two Oscars and was the third highest grossing movie at the time of its release.






During her time acting she met businessman and pilot, Howard Hughes. Hughes encouraged and enabled her creative aptitude by giving her access to his scientists and engineers, and gifting her a small set of equipment to use in her trailer between sets while she was away filming. A couple of Hedy's notable inventions were aerodynamic improvements to planes and a dissolvable flavoring that resembled Coca Cola.

Her greatest invention came as a proposed solution during World War II. In 1940 she met George Antheil, another inventive spirit, who shared concerns about the war overseas. She took the knowledge she had gained of various weaponry while playing host for her former husband and Nazi munitions supplier, Fritz Mandl, and began working with Antheil to invent technologies to help combat the Axis powers.



Sadly, when the invention was proposed for it's intended use, the navy rejected it. It wasn't until decades later, in 1997, that Lamarr and Antheil were formally recognized for their invention. Their research went on to influence the development of WIFI, GPS, and Bluetooth, and in 2014 Lamarr was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame for the development of frequency hopping technology.



Their ideas culminated and materialized in the form of what they called, "Secret Communication System", patented in 1942 under Hedy's then-current married name, Hedy Markey. The invention intended to make use of frequency hopping to guide torpedoes successfully to their targets without the risk of jamming. Now the course of a torpedo could be redirected after launch in secret.

# MONIKA CRONBERG

Student to Teacher

The art is mostly landscapes and animals, in a variety of media – acrylics, soft pastel, graphite, pour painting, oil colored pencil, torn paper collage, some small wire sculptures – all along the walls, on shelves, even leaning against the fireplace. It might be a small gallery, but this is Monika Cronberg's

workspace, filled with art she's created over the last 10 years.

Why all the different media? "I think I'm an explorer. I don't know that I'll ever settle into one medium, because I really do enjoy learning and trying different ways to use those mediums," says Monika. "No matter what, I keep exploring. It's the creative side – 'if this works here, why wouldn't it work there?"

#### **A Reluctant Student**

In 2010, Monika found herself taking an art class at Cochise College, pushed into it by friends who needed another student so the class would 'make'. The class started with basic technique and charcoal, and though Monika wore gloves because she didn't even like the touch of charcoal, she somehow got past it and discovered she really enjoyed it.

"I had to be dragged into it because I had the mindset – I think a lot of people do – I don't have any talent; there's no way I can do it, I don't have the talent. It was good for me to realize that, as my mother-in-law, who was a fantastic artist, said to me a long, long time ago, 'it's got nothing to do with the amount of talent you have – it's like 5% talent and 95% work.""

About her favorite medium today, she says, "I keep gravitating back to the graphite, which is crazy. I've enjoyed venturing further with acrylics, and oil painting



still scares me to death." Some of her favorite subjects are animals, especially her cats, of whom she has many portraits.

Referring to her approach to art, she says "I do get in my own way a lot because I tend to be a perfectionist. Initially acrylic was really hard to work with. It dried too fast

and I was too slow. Thankfully with acrylic you can go back. You can actually go back over it. The feeling of satisfaction when you're able to bring something out of

yourself and put it on paper or canvas, and other people get some joy from it. That means a lot."

Monika continues to explore new techniques through classes, including online. A recent class looked at how to make the perfect painting. In it, she learned about the inward aspects of

the artist and how that affects the outward result. "I actually enjoy the pour painting because it got me out of my head a little bit, and I needed that – I was getting so it

wasn't fun anymore. It made me explore imagination again, which I wasn't doing".

One powerful piece is called Purple Pain. "It's a self portrait when I was going through some pretty tough times when my Mother had died and it just expressed the place where I was at that time. Being able to let your emotions go to a medium like that, that was kind of powerful."

Art is an intensely personal experience. "It helped me break some personal barriers, I think, and some personal negativity," she said. "I would talk myself out of things because I didn't think I was good enough. I finally got out of my own way. It would be what it would be, but I'd

be better for it."

### **An Eager Teacher**

After a teaching career as a reading specialist, Monika was able to

combine her profession with her love of art to introduce an art program at Bonita School, "Based on how I kind of grew/drew to art, I was able to start the art program out at Bonita. It really made a difference for some of these kids to realize "Oh. I really can do this".

Now Monika is bringing her teaching and art together again at Willcox Theater and Arts to develop and launch the ACE of ARTS program –
